



# What's Name?

[Excerpt from HU Alumni Magazine, Fall 2005]

HEN the Hampton University Class of 1973 hears the word Ogre, they're not referring to the big green ogre in the movie "Shrek." Instead, the word makes 1973 HU alumni reminisce about their freshman year at HU and how their rebelliousness led to a now treasured HU tradition of class names. They were the first Ogre Phi Ogre class. But how in the world did they come up with Ogre Phi Ogre? And how has it been able to last this long?

Over the past 36 years, HU has carried out a tradition that has been a mystery to most of us who have passed through the University's doors. Many have questioned, Why are the class names Ogre Phi Ogre, Quintessence and Onyx, and how did this tradition begin?' There are many versions of how the tradition started, but we have unfolded the mystery.

It all began in the fall of 1969, when HU freshmen were considered to be at the bottom of the food chain and the upperclassmen ruled the campus. According to Dr. Pollie Murphy '73, the upperclassmen were able to participate in many organizations, more so than the freshmen. "At that time upperclassmen were able to pledge social organizations during the fall semester and Greek organizations during the spring semester," said Murphy. "We couldn't participate as freshmen."

"The school was much smaller so you knew just about everyone," said Hilary Jones '73. "Freshman men lived in James Hall and everyone knew everyone."

According to Jones, one night a group of the freshman guys were hanging out in James Hall and came up with the name Ogre Phi Ogre. "There was no grand plan," he said. "We were just a very close-knit class that did everything together. Everyone picked up on it and we were cool; we were just Ogres."

But who would ever think of Ogre Phi Ogre as a class name? "A couple of us guys were always sitting around James Hall arguing about something," said Sidney Ricks '73. "This time we were arguing about what was strong enough to kill a wildebeest, and David Jones said, 'An Ogre.'"

According to Ricks, the heated debate led to the discussion of how the freshmen were treated poorly on campus. "We would go to off-campus parties with freshman women and they would be allowed in but the freshman guys would be excluded," said Ricks. "Someone decided that as freshmen, we would start our own organization, Ogre Phi Ogre."

They named their class Ogre Phi Ogre, but they needed to spread the word. "We pulled the fire alarm in James Hall so everyone had to assemble on Bemis field," he said. "Dean Campbell had to check every room before they were able to release us, so while he was doing that we were spreading the word that we were Ogres, and Bernard Thompson, also known as 'Lil' Dino,' was granted the official title, King of the Ogres."

In order to spread the word to the female freshmen, Ricks said they picked a topic and arranged a "seminar" in the lobby of Harkness Hall. "The real plan was to get the group together, put on some music, and get to know each other," he said. "Hey, it worked. The next thing I know the guys were chanting Ogre Phi Ogre and the ladies were chanting Ogre Phi Ogrettes, and the rest is history."

Just because the groovy Class of 1973 was graduating didn't mean that Ogre Phi Ogre had to die. They decided to continue their legacy and pass the name on to the freshman class, the Class of 1976.

... This fall HU welcomed the Class of 2009, Ogre Phi Ogre XIII.

We may have chosen one as our primary cafeteria or alternated between the two during the years; whichever, we were privileged to have a choice. The large cafeteria provided more action and excitement where we could see the Greeks and social clubs

put on block shows; we could hang out around the grounds, wander over to Ogden Hall, sit and chat on the steps, get to see and know folk...and laugh! Maybe we could see that one special "heart throb". It was fun.

And the laundry service...the laundry was nice. Our jeans would come back so heavily starched that they could walk without us being in them. And the crease seemed permanent.

Finally, graduation day came and we could walk across Ogden Circle at last! The Class of 1976-- Hamptonians forever!



# **Rep. Barbara Jordan**Commencement Address

May 23, 1976

"...I have come... to hear your voices, to listen to your music. I have not heard your music for the last four years. ... Why have you become so silent?.. Why, are you so quiet?... Are you afraid to speak up? ... It is important to discover whether you will raise your voices for the common good or whether you will join the chorus of those who are looking out for their own interest. We are victims right now in Washington, D.C., of men and women who make no music and have no dreams. What will become of the future?"



"... The job market is tight, and it is discriminating more instead of less. The government is so big and so insensitive that it is run by politicians and bureaucrats... The last politician that declared that he wasn't a crook is now in exile."



"... We need a leader in this country with a positive vision of the future ... The government is in jeopardy because some of our citizens refuse to participate. .. Withdrawal is not the answer. .. You cannot afford that luxury."



"... Ralph Ellison's invisible man realized in the end that he had over stayed his hibernation – that even an invisible man has a social responsibility. It is time for you to make some music. It is time for you to dream again, unless you have forgotten how. There is no need for you to try to conjure up new myths, new slogans – the old ones will suffice. It may be necessary, or it may not be necessary to hear the stamp of marching feet again. All I know is that I for one will be listening for a better America as you make the music. Don't disappoint me."






